



Welcome Missy McGinnis

In April, Friends Homes welcomed **Missy McGinnis** as the new Associate Executive Director for the Guilford Campus. Missy replaces **Tim Jackson** who retired in March.

Born Melessia McAninch in Des Moines, Iowa, in 1970, she remained in Iowa and holds degrees from Drake University and Des Moines University of Osteopathic Medicine and Health Sciences. Her degrees are in public administration, a long term care specialist certificate, and health care administration. Missy was also adjunct faculty at Des Moines University where she taught the social gerontology program for those pursuing a nursing home administrator's license. (Interesting side note, Missy and Tim Jackson both grew up in Des Moines, Iowa, and both attended Drake University.) Missy's parents and grandmothers are still living in Des Moines, as well as her only sister.

While attending Drake University, Missy also worked part-time as an editorial assistant, staff writer and columnist for the Des Moines Register newspaper. Some outstanding moments of her career at the Register were the collapse of the Berlin wall, coverage of the 1988 and 1992 caucuses and presidential elections, and the crash of United Airlines Flight 232 in Sioux City, Iowa, in 1989. She also worked as an editorial assistant to Jane Schorer who won a Pulitzer Prize during that time.



After completing her bachelor's degree and internship, and passing her nursing home administration boards, Missy married University of Iowa history major **Michael McGinnis** and they moved to Carroll, Iowa. Missy was administrator of the Carroll Health Center and Westwood Knolls apartments for 18 years and Mike taught social studies and coached varsity boys' basketball at Jefferson-Scranton High School. The skilled nursing facility and independent living apartments went through many changes over the time that she was there, becoming Medicare-

certified, starting a homecare program, and developing an Alzheimer's unit. Both of Missy's sons, **Jackson** and **Holden**, were raised in Carroll, Iowa. Both of Missy's grandfathers lived at the Carroll Health Center, before passing.

The family moved to Huntersville, NC, in 2013, when the Carroll Health Center was sold. Mike's family is native to Morganton, NC, and Charleston, SC, so the Carolinas were an easy choice in picking where to relocate. Jackson has autism and the Charlotte area was chosen partly for the autistic program available at Philips Academy of Charlotte. Jackson attends classes to prepare him for real world living, and Mike teaches at the school. Her other son, Holden, is 6'6" tall and a junior at Hough High School in Cornelius.

Missy worked as the Executive Director of Huntersville Oaks and as the Administrator at Sharon Towers since moving to North Carolina. She has enjoyed boating on Lake Norman, participating in the Northstone Bunco group, traveling to all of the great tourist areas that the Carolinas offer, as well as being a spectator at Special Olympics and Hough High School sporting events.

Missy is excited to be a part of the Friends Homes family and looks forward to getting to know all of the residents and teammates.

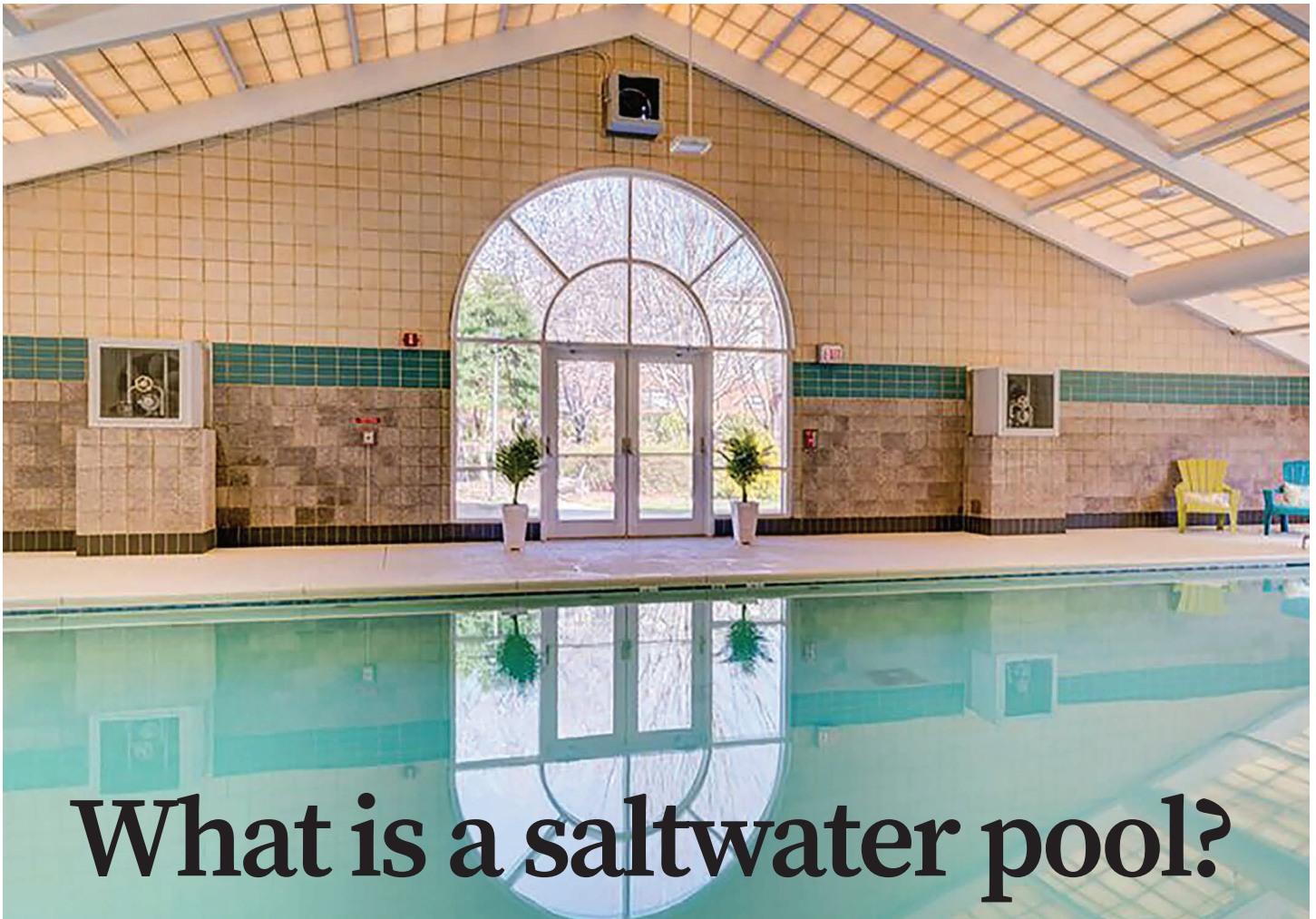

What is a saltwater pool?

As the wellness director of Friends Homes, **Teresa Cox** is in charge of the pool at Friends Homes West.

“Folks periodically ask me questions about our saltwater pool system – which was a ‘pool makeover’ for us in the spring of 2015,” she says. “A lot of misconceptions are out there about saltwater pools and it seems the answers can get either super-complicated or a tiny bit vague.”

A saltwater chlorination system means that dissolved salt serves as a reserve from which to generate chlorine (2900 – 3500 ppm salinity). This generator may have many names in discussion – chlorine generator, salt cell, salt generator and a few more, but the end result is the same. The process of electrolysis is used to cleave chlorine from sodium in the dissolved saltwater. This action produces hypochlorous acid and sodium hypochlorite in a saltwater chlorination pool. In everyday practice,

a saltwater pool is host to a fairly simple way to generate chlorine rather than adding it chemically.

Traditional pools add chemical chlorine to provide the sanitizing needed for people to safely swim, but in a saltwater pool, free chlorine is almost constantly “made available” by the electrolysis process. While a saltwater pool must be monitored in the same way as traditionally chlorinated pools, the overall benefits are enormous:

1. Higher investment on front-end cost – lower maintenance overall
2. Safer – no handling of sodium hypochlorite solution
3. Skin issues are minimal – by creating free chlorine, we eliminate chloramines (chlorine + amines

which can be irritating), so everyone’s skin is much happier.

4. The more-controlled levels of chlorine helps maintain the color and fiber of swimsuits. (Note above that I mentioned “constantly” and that is a key factor in the precise control of the antibacterial properties of generated chlorine)

After our initial “break-in” period from re-plastering our pool, the pH is now incredibly stabilized. Our need for acid has diminished (which balances the “basic” nature of the generated chlorine), so now our pool has very little need for anything other than an occasional bag of pool salt and a bit of acid to keep the pH in check.

The Friends Homes pool is a great way to cool off or warm up, relax or to work hard or just sit in the “vortex” jets and feel really good when you get out and you might even find a little socialization as an extra benefit.

Although **Joan Worrell** spent the first 21 years of her life in Long Crendon, a village of about 800 souls in Buckinghamshire, England, before coming to the United States as a war bride, you must listen very closely to hear an English accent. Her story is very interesting, and it begins in Cologne, Germany.

Joan was born in the hospital on the British military base in Cologne, where her father was in the military mounted police after World War I. When she was 8 months old, her father took Joan and her German mother to live with his English mother in Long Crendon while he fulfilled his military service. Joan likes to laugh at this part of her story. She said, “Can you imagine? My mother spoke very little English and his mother – my grandmother – spoke no German, but we managed. They doted on me, and I was quite spoiled.”

When Joan was about 20 years old, her cousin was dating an American soldier. Unfortunately, her cousin was not allowed to bring him to her home, so he asked Joan for a date. **Lloyd W. Haley**, who was stationed in nearby Wheatley, bought a bicycle so he could ride the 16-mile round-trip to court Joan and after 5 months he proposed to her. They were married, and after 1 month he was sent to the 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt, Germany. Joan stayed in Long Crendon.

Lloyd did manage to visit; he caught a ride with a pilot buddy one Christmas Eve, flying from Frankfurt to England. He was dropped off near Long Crendon, hitch-hiked the rest of the way, and woke Joan during the night by throwing lumps of dirt up at her window. Needless to say, Joan was surprised.

When Joan was 21, Lloyd was discharged and sent back to the U.S. As he prepared their home in Chicago, Joan, with a large group of other war brides, traveled to the British Army camp, Aldershot, to await transport to New York. A fire aboard the ship delayed the journey for a week. They then crossed the Atlantic in 8 days, cleared through Ellis Island (“the fog was so thick that I never did see the Statue of Liberty,” says Joan), but instead

things she had wanted or needed during the war: chocolate, sugar, and clothes. She quickly got a job in the underwriting department at Kemper Insurance and discovered that “if you had the money, you could buy anything you wanted.”

There was one unexpected challenge. Two years after they settled in Chicago, Joan applied for her citizenship papers and was turned down because of her birth in Germany. Anti-German sentiment was still high so soon after the war. “It was more difficult than it should have been, since my father was English and I was born in a British military hospital,” she said, “but we finally worked it out.”

Joan and Lloyd were married for 46 years. After his death, she met and married her second husband, **Ben Worrell**, who had family ties in Greensboro, NC, and to whom she was married for 13 years. When Ben became ill, they left Chicago and moved here to Greensboro, where he passed away. Joan decided to stay in Greensboro and moved to Friends Homes West in 2013.

And her accent? Joan says that Lloyd helped her with her ‘American’ English, telling her that since she was in the United States, she needed to learn the proper way to say “tomato” and “potato.” It appears that in many ways, Joan was a quick study, indeed.

of boarding a train for Chicago, a railroad strike diverted the whole group to Coney Island, a gathering spot for soldiers going overseas. A week later, the strike was over, so Joan and her weary travelers boarded a train to Chicago, where she was finally reunited with Lloyd.

Joan’s first impression of Chicago was that of amazement. “There were so many people of all different colors,” she recalls, “And there were so many different languages.” Learning how to take the ‘L’ train (short for “elevated”) was difficult, and she got lost a few times. “Growing up in Long Crendon did not prepare me for life in Chicago,” she laughs. And the stores! She now discovered that she could buy all of the

Friends Homes enhances technology

Friends Homes has been rapidly expanding its technology options in 2017. Human resources, nursing and maintenance have all had new software installed this year to conduct their duties. In addition, both campuses have recently upgraded their internet capacities.

To train the workforce of tomorrow, Friends Homes employees are participating in an on-line training program called Relias. This software program has more than 700 training modules that are available to the staff at both Friends Homes Guilford and Friends Homes West. Instead of the old-fashioned way of presenting the training programs where all staff is required to listen to a speaker, the modules are set up in such a way that the employee progresses at their own individual speed. All of the modules have tests to measure comprehension and a training record is created to track the employee’s training. The lab located in Hinshaw Hall is equipped with 10 computers and is used for staff training and orientation. There is also a 3-bay site at Friends Home’s West.

This program is coordinated by **Carla Price**, Human Resources Orientation Nurse.

Recently the computer lab has been used to train the nursing staff at both campuses on the Matrix software program for electronic health records. Kiosks, wall-mounted computer screens, are being placed throughout skilled nursing and assisted living. This will enable nursing assistants to rapidly chart the care that they provide and have real-time nursing instruction on plans of care. Nurses will now pass medications from an administration record on a laptop computer mounted to their carts, and be able to document any notes and assessments on their laptops. Administration will be able to run quality reports to check on trends and red flags from a dashboard on their desktop computers. This will all feed to a care plan data base coordinated by Resident Assessment Nurses **Jeanne Martin** and **Barbara Smith**.

WorxHub is a new software program introduced in June that is used by

maintenance to streamline the work order system, making it simpler for all parties involved to see the work order through every step and to ensure that issues do not slip through the cracks. Residents can still submit their work orders to the reception desk, where they will be entered into the system electronically. Maintenance techs will be able to view these work orders from wherever they are via iPads. Any resident wishing to check on the status or work being done on their work order need only call the reception desk. The reception desk can look up any work order put into the system and see the status and any notes left by the technician. As we progress with the use of the system, residents will be able to submit work orders from the convenience of their own homes. Residents will also be able to submit transportation requests as well. WorxHub is managed by Administrative Assistant **Alex Todd** in Facility Services.
